Carbon Footprint

As environmental humanists, we recognize that inperson meetings such as the ASLE conference are largely made possible by fossil fuels and thereby contribute to climate change. We selected this conference site due to its relative proximity to many ASLE members, as well as its connectivity to interstate rail transit. Additionally, College Park Station is on the Green Line of the DC light rail metro system, and we encourage attendees to utilize it when possible.

Donations

ASLE has donated \$500 to the Accokeek Foundation at Piscataway Park, and we invite attendees who are able to join us by donating \$25 or more.

Campus Housing Check-In and Check-Out

Campus dorm guests can check in after 11am on the date of their reservation. Check-in desk is staffed 24 hours, and located in the main lobby of Prince Frederick Hall.

Guests will receive a swipe card for building entry to their assigned hall/cafeteria, and a physical key for their room. There is an intercom call box if nobody is at the desk when you arrive, all guests will need to be buzzed in to check in, as buildings are locked at all times. **Phone: 301-314-3733**

Campus Parking

If you purchased parking passes, pick them up at housing check-in (dorm guests) or at registration (commuters). Campus parking fees are \$4/hr, up to a max of \$20 per vehicle per day, including for overnight guests. You should plan to pay for an hour of parking while getting checked in or registered—parking is rigorously enforced! Recommended Lots for daily parking: 1B behind Tawes (for commuters), Mowat Lane levels 5/6 (for dorm guests). Union Lane Garage (near Stamp) has metered parking only

On-Campus Dining

Participants who are staying in dorms (includes breakfast and lunch), or purchased a lunch package, can dine at the South Campus Dining Hall. Others can see if the dining hall has space for walk-ups, or visit the Stamp Student Union Food Court; please note summer hours may be limited. Dinners are on your own. ASLE provides vegetarian/vegan/GF appetizers at all receptions.

The lunch break each day is 1.5 hours long; please note times may vary slightly day to day, noted in the program. Dining Hall hours are 11:00am—1pm (if you arrive by 1pm you can still get food, after 1pm they will not let you enter!).

Technology

Weather in College Park

Exhibit: Homegrown: An Introduction to the Environmental Justice Movement HORNBAKE LIBRARY GALLERY

"Homegrown: An Introduction to the Environmental Justice Movement" highlights how the environmental justice movement began with the rise of civil rights, labor, and environmentalism movements in the midtwentieth century. The materials in "Homegrown" are pulled from multiple collections within UMD Libraries' Special Collections and University Archives (SCUA), underscoring the breadth of our collections and the global phenomena of environmental injustice and racism. Items in the exhibit range from censored newspaper articles on radioactivity in postwar Japan to photographs of the Delano Grape Strike and Boycott, a strike started in 1965 of over 800 Filipino farmworkers affiliated with the Agricultural Workers Organizing Committee.

Building on interdisciplinary work on smell as a capacity for sensing and communicating about unevenly distributed atmospheres, this talk takes a speculative approach to olfactory aesthetics by considering smell as a mode of sensorial worldmaking. The concept of worldmaking—which has been important to recent work in phenomenology, speculative fiction, the environmental humanities, queer of color critique, and critical race studies—draws attention to the quiet ways in which the "distribution of the sensible" reproduces racial and colonial capitalism's ecocidal modes of relation, and provokes questions about how sensory dispositions and infrastructures might open onto otherwise worlds. Insofar as smell refuses liberal norms of disinterestedness, distance, discreteness, universality, and autonomy, it centers sensory experience as a mode of relational knowledge that exceeds the bounds of individuality and species. I will discuss a range of literary and multimodal works that experiment with smell as a medium of more-than-human communication and kin-making.

HSUAN HSU received his PhD in English from UC Berkeley. He is a Professor of English at the University of California, Davis, where he works in the fields of American literature, environmental humanities, critical ethnic studies, sensory studies, and cultural geography. His publications include <u>Geography and the Production of Space in Nineteenth-Century American Literature</u> (Cambridge, 2010), <u>The Smell of Risk: Atmospheric Disparities and the Olfactory Arts (NYU, 2020)</u>, <u>Air Conditioning</u> (Bloomsbury, 2024), and articles in journals such as *ISLE*, American Literary History, American Literature, and Camera Obscura.
